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PORTRAIT PHOTOGRAPHY Tips & Tricks

Lighting

When it comes to portrait photography, there is nothing more important than lighting. You could be at the exact same location and have bad lighting and the shot will just not work as well as when you have good lighting.

So what does that mean? You want to make sure you go out in the morning or afternoon, when the sun is a bit lower on a clear, sunny day. If you go out during the middle of the day, the lighting can be too harsh, resulting in glary light and washed out photos.


Then, you want to find patches of sunlight that are either hitting the ground or a building. Once you have done that, tell the model to stand in the light patch and you will have a lovely portrait.






Exposure

When the model is standing in the sunlight, tap on your phone screen and drag the exposure slider until the model's face is properly exposed.







In addition, exposing for the highlights will draw the viewer in and direct their attention towards the subject of your image.




Framing



Another important tip is framing. Basically, this means,


How Can I Find The Best Background For My Portraits





I personally like to keep things simple so that the model stands out and is the main focus of the image. To do this, avoid having objects with a lot of details like crowds of people or large trees behind your model. Look for simple patterns or walls that are painted a single color.







Portrait Mode



Using portrait mode ensures that your model will stand out and not get mixed up with the background of the photo. It also gives your photos that professional look. The 1x zoom is great for times when you would like to have more of the surrounding environment in the frame. By including more of the location in the background of your photo, you can express more emotion in your portraits and tell a deeper story.




STANDS OUT LEVEL UP



I like to use the 2x zoom when I want to **isolate my image** so that there is only a background and a subject. This is great when there are distracting elements that you don't want to include in your image.

For example, have a look at these two photos and think about how you feel when you look at them.





2x zoom 1x zoom

When I use the 1x zoom the photo feels a bit empty and boring, the windows create a distracting reflection and there is half of a concrete box on the right side of the frame. **These** elements do not add to the story or emotions of the image, which is why we want to leave them out of the shot by using the 2x zoom.

When I use the 2x zoom, the photo model stands out and the background pattern fills the entire frame.

It feels easy and nice to look at because there are only two things in the frame, the model and the background.






If you can find simple backdrops like this, your portraits will level up instantly.

Editing

In portrait photography, a clean and focused composition is crucial for making the subject stand out. After applying various composition and lighting techniques, post-processing becomes an essential step to enhance your photos. For example, one powerful tool you should utilize is the Al Eraser 2.0, available on Reno12 Pro.



It's as simple as that! Now you have a clean photo without any distracting elements.



In this photo here, you can see that there is a pedestrian in the background, which could be distracting to the viewer. To erase it, simply click on edit > eraser. Then draw over the object you want to remove. It's as simple as that! Now you have a clean photo without any distracting elements.

Here are the tips and tricks that I wish I knew the first time I tried photography!

Window Lighting





The OPPO 12 Pro captures amazing portraits in Portrait Mode and with a very simply tip you can create stunning shots of your subject that pop! My favorite lighting to utilize in my photography style is indoor natural lighting.



I can truly bring out all the beautiful features and details in my subjects using a very simple lighting setup with no equipment other than my OPPO 12.

You can achieve the same effect by positioning your subject directly facing an open window.

The natural light coming in through the window will illuminate your subject without casting harsh direct lighting.



Look at the behind-the-scenes photo of how I took this headshot here. Bonus Tip! You can also stand outside of the window and take a picture of your subject through the glass to get a very creative and unique shot.



Bright and Clean



Have you heard the word "aesthetic" used before? Have you seen very beautiful and cohesive Instagram feeds that feel like a dream? Well, that's what I call the "Bright" and Clean" style.

This style is very simple, but very aesthetic and will give you a consistent look on your Instagram page or photography portfolio.

Look for a plain white background, or even immerse your subject around white fabrics to capture photos that feel light and airy.

In these examples I have a very simple portrait against a white wall and the second shot is taken by simply draping a white curtain around Jess!



Colorfu Backdrops

If plain isn't your style and you like to be bold with your photography, then you can look for colors that pop in your environment and utilize those. Whenever I am out on a photoshoot, I love to look for color in my environment. This could be an art mural downtown, a vibrant green plant, or even a solid-colored backdrop.


When using colorful backgrounds in your image, a tip you can use to really elevate your photos is to pay attention to combination of colors in your image. There is a science behind colors and by combining certain colors with each other, you can create very eye-catching and balanced color palettes.





Color combinations that work well together are very pleasant to the eye and evoke emotions that make your images speak.





Complimentary colors are a very simple color combination to start with. Complimentary colors are simply colors that are on opposite sides from each other on a color wheel. If you're subject is wearing red, find a green background to make the image pop! If you're heading to a sunflower patch, tell your subject to wear purple to pleasantly compliment the yellow flowers.

Framing Your Subject

A slightly more advanced tip, but still easy to incorporate, is to frame your subject using objects. A frame is like a picture frame. It creates a border around the image that accentuates and highlights whatever is inside the frame. A frame tells you what to look at!







You can create your own frames within your photos using objects such as plants, holes, or even using the subject's own hands! Look at these examples where I used an indoor plant to shoot the subject through. It adds a creative touch to the image that directs your eyes to the main part of the photo. We even had some fun using Jess' hands and fingers to frame herself. Give it a try!



Relaxing Vacation Poses

Posing was often the most difficult part of learning portrait photography when I just started. What do I tell my subject? Where do I put my hands when I'm in a photo? It can feel like a complicated thing, but posing can be quite simple. Even a simple pose will have you and your subjects looking like a pro!





Look at the images in the colorful backdrops section. Notice that I always find something to do with the subject's hands. In one photo, simply holding onto your arm on the opposite side creates such a simple but effective pose.



In the next shot, for that summer look, taking each end of a summer dress solves that question of what to do with your hands. In these two photos, notice that I simply have Jess have her hands gently touching each other. What about the legs?


Well in each of the 4 photos I mentioned, you'll see that the legs are crossed in each shot. That's an easy hack to look like you've been doing this for years!



Using Props

One of my personal favorite tips for photography is the use of props in my portraits. Props are such a fun and easy way to make your images stand out and give them a unique touch. Props can be things that you find in nature, like the leaves of an indoor plant.





By the way, can you see the use of framing in this shot to highlight Jess' eye? Or a prop can be something playful that you bring on your photoshoot.

Editing

It's very simple to use.

All you must do is highlight the object by selecting it with your finger and then click the Eraser Al button.





Voila! You've become an editing pro with a click of a button. Now you can remove that silly photobomber that tried to ruin your shot! Who is laughing now?



Best Face Al

One of the most powerful tools on the OPPO 12 Pro is Best Face Al. This feature is so amazing that it can take a group photo that has blurry faces in them and make each face as clear as day!







I couldn't believe this feature the first time I used it. So next, time your friend says not to share that group shot he took because he was blurry, you can amaze him by using Best Face Al to turn the shot back into a masterpiece.
